

## Vicar Jane reflects on generosity...

I think faithfulness to God is such a big call because it encompasses all aspects of our lives, and I touched upon some of this in the video, being faithful is an on-going process of learning and growing, sometimes we get it right and sometimes we don't. I'm very thankful that God forgives and that we as God's children have new starts and new opportunities.

We have seen many acts of kindness during this pandemic.

On the television, Foodbanks being set up in schools and people making protective equipment for Health Workers to use.

Nearer to home, Judy or her staff from Food for Thought bakery delivering shopping and groceries to those people who are vulnerable and not able to get out. Beryl, one of the people in my Pastoral Care group at Church, is elderly (as are many) and only rides a bike (does not drive), and lives in nearby the One Stop shop. She does go in there for some items, but a lady from down her road is very kindly doing shopping for her (along with another person's), collecting a list from Beryl of what she wants. Beryl's sister - Alma - and her neighbour are doing her shopping. And so many more...

A few weeks ago now when talking with Chris, the Church Gardener, he was telling me that one of his customers is a Minister who lives in Sandbach. Chris had gone one Saturday morning to mow the grass, and the Minister said he had got to go out for some shopping. Chris had said that he should not be going out really, and as a result - each time Chris goes on a Saturday morning, he takes some shopping and provisions with him for the Minister, so that he has some food in. Chris gives his wife a list when she does their shopping, which he then takes with him to Sandbach, thus Chris not doing it himself another day.

There will be many more acts of kindness around which we never hear about. Let's not forget Tom fetching Vicar Jane a drink during the PCC Zoom Meeting, these things do not go unnoticed!
